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Local Civil War Veterans Honored in Observance of 150th Anniversary of the Battle of Gettysburg

After success at Chancellorsville, Virginia, General Robert E. Lee confidently marched his forces through the Shenandoah Valley crossing into Pennsylvania on July 1, 1863. The advancing Confederates were confronted at Gettysburg by the Union's Army of the Potomac commanded by General George G. Meade. Fierce fighting continued throughout the next day at various sites surrounding the small farming town. On July 3, Lee ordered an attack at Cemetery Ridge. The assault known as "Pickett's Charge," weakened the Union lines but failed to break through. On July 4, Lee was forced to withdraw his troops and return to Virginia. As we observe the 150th anniversary of the Battle of Gettysburg, it's important to note the local men who volunteered to fight with the Union Forces. The following names are on file at the Nanticoke Historical Society Offices. For the sake of space, we have given a brief note about each, but more information can be obtained on these men as well as family names listed by obtaining an **Historical Research Request Form** online or at the Historical Society offices.

Alexander, J.P. Enlisted in Union Army 4/22/1861 under Maj. Gen W.H. Gore, Co. 1 1st Reg. Reserves, Infantry Battalion, 2nd Reg. US Infantry. Served in 32 battles and skirmishes including Gettysburg, Interred at Newport Cemetery.

Alexander, John – Served in the 41st PA Infantry

Alexander, Eugene – Served in the 41st PA Infantry

Arnold, Levin, Served in the war of the rebellion. Interred at Hanover Green Cemetery

Carey, John – Died 1918 -

Cosler, Jacob – Member of the G.A.R., a fraternal organization composed of veterans of the Union Army, US Navy, Marines and Revenue Cutter

1956 – 57 YEARS AGO IN NANTICOKE

In this publication of our newsletter we chose to focus on the year 1956 and topics of interest appearing in the Times Leader Evening News. Here are some of the things that were happening in Nanticoke from July to December of that year.

July

The largest budget in the history of the Nanticoke School District, \$767,425 was adopted.

Nanticoke Businessmen's Association planned the first Friday the 13th sales promotions. Over 35 to 40 stores participated.

One of Nanticoke's oldest landmarks, the **Cimmet's Building** was being remodeled. The Sterling Variety Store housed in the building, was established by **Harry Cimmet** 47 years prior.

August

Leonard Pawlowski representing the executive group of Samantha Mill Citizens Committee appeared before Mayor **Frank E. Kielar** and members of city council to request the quit claim deed be furnished to trustees of the estate so construction of the \$100,000 library could begin. Atty. **Charles Makar** informed the committee that the deed would be ready and submitted to the mayor for proper signatures. The mayor announced that the city will maintain the balance of the Mill estate grounds surrounding the library to the best of its ability. Also present at the meeting were **Alois Bohinski** and **Martin Zaniecki**.

September

The Tank Company of the 109th Infantry Regiment in Nanticoke planned to sponsor a Miss Nanticoke Tanker contest. Members were

Culp, Peter - 149th Reg. PA Volunteers Bucktail Brigade. Came to Nanticoke in 1890.

Culver, John M. – Lived on Allen Street in West Nanticoke.

Davis, William L. – fought at the battle of Gettysburg was wounded by saved by a fellow soldier. Resided on E. Green Street

Dunn, John – Enlisted in Co K of the 187 Regiment served in the war for three years. Married to, Frances E. Coolbaugh of Hanover Township. He lived in Nanticoke after the war and is buried in Hanover Green Cemetery.

Espy, Barnet – Served in the 41st PA Infantry

Espy, Theodore – Served in the 41st PA Infantry

Fogerty, Daniel – Is pictured in a Historical Society photo taken in front of Hill and Evans Hardware on May 30, 1893.

Freed, John G. – Dentist in the 200th Reg. PA Volunteers before transferring to 51st Regiment.

Freeman, Norman – With Co. A 90th Reg. of NY Infantry Volunteers. Lived on North Mill Street, West Nanticoke.

Hall, John D. – Lived on N. Mill Street, West Nanticoke.

James, Samuel J. – Fought at Gettysburg.

Keithline, Peter – Served with the 203rd PA Infantry

King, John Perry – Oldest surviving Civil War veteran in Wyoming Valley died in 1942. Arrived in Nanticoke in 1942. Was a member of Company I, Pa Infantry.

Lape, Andrew A. – Served in the 9th Infantry, died in service.

Lape, Frank – Served in the 52nd PA Infantry

Lape, William – Served in the 9th PA Infantry, imprisoned in Andersonville. Died 1864

Leisenring, William – Buried in Hanover Green Cemetery

Line, Cornelius – Served in the 41st PA Infantry

Line, Samuel – Served in the 41st PA Infantry

McLeish, T. – Officer – no other details

Montgomery, Robert – A member of the Conyngham Post G.A.R.

Moyer, William – Lived at 37 N. Mill Street, West Nanticoke

Nash, William – Last surviving veteran of the war from West Nanticoke in 1931.

Owens, Edward “Pop” - Lived at 319 E. Broad Street. Served throughout the war as a member of the 3rd PA Heavy Artillery, Died in 1924, surviving members of his family Charles Owens, Wilkes-Barre; Nora Bellas, sister and John Owens, brother, both of Nanticoke.

Powell, John R. – Served with Co. K 132nd Reg. Pennsylvania Volunteers

Reese, Shadrach – Served for three years as private under Captain John Craig and Col. J.W. Geary with the 28th Regiment Penn Volunteers. Fought at Harper's Ferry, Leesburg, Bull Run, Antietam, Chancellorsville and Gettysburg. Died at his home on E. Noble Street. Is buried in Nanticoke Cemetery.

Rinehimer, Cornelius – Is buried at Slocum Cemetery

Rood, Almon W. - Served as a sharpshooter in Co. F 143rd Pennsylvania Volunteers. Moved to Nanticoke in 1875.

Schultz, William – Served as a sergeant in the Civil War. Lived in West Nanticoke.

Sieple, Tillman – Lived on E. Broad Street. Had a son Charles and daughter Mary who lived in Nanticoke. Is buried in the Nanticoke Cemetery.

Sheppard or (Schappert), Jacob – Survived the war – Married to Rebecca.

Skipper, Elijah J. – Resident of Nanticoke for 50 years. Had two daughters who remained in the area Mrs. J.L. George and Mrs. Jenkin R. Davis.

Sorber, John – Was with Sherman in Atlanta during the famous march to the sea. He was captured by Rebels and confined at Libby Prison.

Sorber, Nathaniel – Member of the Grand Army Lodge. He had two local relatives listed, Mrs. VanFossen, sister, Nanticoke and William Pressler, grandson, West Nanticoke.

Stachowiak, Joseph T. – Served in the 52nd PA Infantry

Szymanowski or Szumowski, John – Joined the Polish Legion of NY, the 58th Regiment under General Kryzanski – Lived with the Thomas Butkiewicz family in Nanticoke.

Vandermark, John – Buried from a relative's home in Nanticoke.

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Walp, Nathan – Member of the 9th PA Cavalry. Took part in march to Raleigh, North Carolina.
Williams, Thomas – Was visiting relatives in Nanticoke, took ill outside the DL&W Store at the Bliss Colliery, and later passed away.
Womelsdorf, Jonathan Veteran of Co. D 52, PA volunteers.

Martin Gronka, principal of Nanticoke High School announced the initial opening of Teen House. Admission was by membership card, available at the door.

October

Mr. and Mrs. **Martin Demko** of Centre Street, Hanover Section of Nanticoke had a mystery on their hands when they found a letter written by a Pennsylvania cavalryman during the Civil War. In the letter penned by **Edward Avery**, Co. 2, of the 9th PA Cavalry to his wife, Evaline, he wrote of the hardships of the battlefield and his concern for national politics. The letter was found in the Demko's garage stacked in a box with other old papers. Neither they, nor the parents of Mrs. Demko, who owned the home prior, were not familiar with the Avery's. A call to Kingston street commissioner Henry Avery revealed he was the grandson of the cavalryman. Mr. Avery reported his grandfather, was thrown from a horse and killed shortly after returning home. But could not account for why the Demko's had the letter.

On March 12, 1917, **William Jenkins** purchased the Leader Store from J.W. Schreiner. In 1956 Jenkins celebrated his 39th year of ownership.

November

Barbara Stachowiak of West Church Street was chosen as “Miss Nanticoke Tanker” at the Tanker Ball held by the 109th Infantry Regiment.

The Nanticoke Businessmen's Association announced the annual “Talk Turkey” Sale. Along with specials offered in stores city-wide, over 40 turkeys were given away and a Thanksgiving dinner valued at over \$10 was awarded.

December

Here's a sampling of goods and services offered in 1956. The Leader Store offered black heel nylon hose for 57 cents, **Wysocki's** Seafood Restaurant on South Market Street advertised an old fashioned chicken dinner with mashed potatoes, gravy, cole slaw and sliced tomato for \$1. **Bavitz** Service Station on Broadway Street sold “snow tread tires” for \$9.95. **Gallie's** Fresh and Frozen Seafood Market listed take out platters of shrimp, oysters, or deviled crab for 75 cents.

DID YOU KNOW?

- One Hundred and Seventy-six men from Hanover Township, which included Nanticoke, joined to fight in the Civil War. Twenty-one of these men died in battles or later from wounds obtained in battle.
- The first of fourteen volunteer companies left Luzerne Counties after the fall of Ft. Sumter on April 12, 1861,
- The Conscription Act of 1863 provided a man eligible to escape the draft by paying a \$300 fee.
- In order to cover the costs of the Civil War, on August 5, 1861, Congress passed a Revenue Act, which represented the very first income tax. The tax was repealed in 1872 and a flat rate tax was passed in 1894.

Nanticoke Historical Society announces move

With the scheduled demolition of two historical sites, The Nanticoke Jr. High School and the State Theatre, a group of citizens passionate about preserving local history for future generations met in 1996 and formed the Nanticoke Historical Society. In 2008, the Society moved from the manse of the First Presbyterian Church to the East Main Street home built in the early 1800's by John Mill. The last surviving member of the Mill family, Samantha, stipulated in her will that the City of Nanticoke establish a public library on the grounds of the Mill Homestead. The Mill Memorial Library was completed in 1958 and serves the community today.
